How you will learn

The methodology of Deusto Summer School courses will be based on the **University of Deusto Learning Model (MAUD)**, adapted to distance learning. This model integrates the stages of contextualization, reflective observation, conceptualization, active experimentation and assessment. A methodology that enables **autonomous learning** and encourages the **development of knowledge, skills, attitudes, capacities and values**. This methodology guarantees a complete learning experience, so that every student can make use of their knowledge in the future.

To apply this methodology the following teaching resources are used:

- Combination of live video conference classes with online learning, through resources and activities on the university's learning platform.
- Use of learning materials in different formats for the presentation of theoretical content.
- Carrying out different learning activities to verify the acquisition of both theoretical and practical knowledge and the acquisition of skills.
- Monitoring and supervision of the students' work.

Course planning

Deusto Summer School courses are organized as follows:

Induction

Participants personal work. Different activities in order to get initiated into the topic of the course.

Course content

In order to work on the content, the course is divided in five live sessions, combined with online learning through resources and activities to be done before and after the video conference.

Closing session

Video conference session to sum up the program, solve questions arose during the course and provide general feedback about the requested activities.



* Gender Segregation in Higher Education Studies

Although the representation of women and girls in the higher education system has increased considerably in the last decades, sex segregation remains a feature of contemporary educational systems. As with other areas of life, education and career aspirations are gendered. In other words, they are directly influenced by the socially constructed and imposed gender roles that maintain women and girls away from certain fields of knowledge. This course will **explore the trends and the future of gender segregation and distribution.**

This course is aligned with the fourth and fifth Sustainable Development Goals: “Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all” and “Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls”. This course will focus on women in education.

* Aims of the course

Considering the commitment of the international community to a) ensure inclusive education to all (SDG 4) and b) promote gender equality at all levels of society (SDG 5), this course is presented with the objectives of

- Identifying emerging trends in gender segregation in higher education studies.
- Questioning the future gender distribution in the different fields of study.

Participants will acquire knowledge about the role of gender in the election of academic studies and how gender impacts the academic trajectory of women and men in different areas of specialisation, such as Computer Engineering and New Technologies, Business, Health Sciences, and Law. After completing the course, students will be able to consider the social factors applicable to academic practices to critically analyse the specific gender equality problems that occur in different academic fields.
